This is the "short list" (basic barebones minimum) of books to read for those who want to begin the process of exercising your duties and rights to peacefully abandon a corrupted government and its underpinning support systems.

These books will give quick insight as to who these men were that came up with the idea of "Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness". It will help you to understand how the Public Body Politic, (aka The Public Weal) meant more to the founder's recognition of power than even the Magna Carta. King James 1st acknowledged the power of The Public Weal in 1603 for the first time.

As far as those who want to know about "Process" in that period, you will get close to those who we adored so much as "Founding Fathers" arose from the majority of cowards who waited to see how the wind would blow after the conflict to create the process the themselves. They made it easy and direct in definition and cannot ever be changed or redefined by politicos. They left these for us to not only respect, but to use again to refresh liberty, whenever it was needed. These founding documents can be used anywhere in the world and not just here in what used to be, the United States of America.

As far as actual meeting rules, one book should be used throughout the land. Believe it or not, that's a lot farther along than the founders were and they would applaud the use of such a volume as it clears the path of any political misunderstandings from location to location.

There are other books written on the subject, but be careful. Stick close to authors who use "source material" and not somebody else's opinion. Some are old and getting very rare. Act now while you can. These should take just a month or so for the average reader. As Churchill said, "you can't know where you're going unless you know where you have been".
