## Beware the Scorpion Weed



It's a pretty purple flower that grows wild during the springtime. But don't be tempted to pick this desert blossom. Known as Scorpion Weed, coming in contact with this wildflower can have a similar reaction as touching poison ivy or oak.

When I was a teen, growing up in

Havasu, I picked wild flowers during the springtime. I don't recall avoiding this particular plant. But years later, when we moved back to Havasu, our son broke into a nasty rash after coming in contact with the devious weed.

These days most locals are savvy to the nasty reactions that can occur if one touches the weed. And I know of one situation, where a student brought his poor, unsuspecting teacher a bouquet of Scorpion Weed. The teacher, new to our area, knew nothing of the weed, and ended up getting very ill.

So remember, when the time comes to do a little weeding in your Havasu yard, beware the Scorpion Weed. And please, don't add them to your spring bouquet!





This is a nasty rash. Your dog can bring the poisonous powder on it's fur so be careful. You can then get it from the rug...or on your bedspread...or just from petting your dog. The dog suffers too.

Rinse the dogs underside and legs when it goes thru the desert on walks.

Use aloe vera gel or juice from the health store... refrigerate it and apply. It is very cool and soothing. Dries it up quickly. Also I find active yogurt soothing.

Also take a benadryl or allergy pill for the week to keep the rash in check.

weed on his fur. He can carry it to you by sitting on the furniture or bed after a desert hike.

## Chandu said...

The hairs lining the flower and seed pods and the small spicules on the leaves contain 5-hydroxytryptamine (serotonin) which cause severe itching (pruritus) when touched. The calyx below the flowers is also a source of itchy spicules (causes Rashes) and the stinging hairs on the outside of the seed pods and flowers are used in itching powder. Water should not be used if contact occurs, as it only dilutes the chemical. Also, one should avoid scratching the exposed area since this causes the hands to transfer the chemical to all other areas touched. Once this happens, one

tends to scratch vigorously and uncontrollably.use raw,unrefined moist tobacco to treat the itching and rashes, the application of cow dung is very effective to treat the itching caused by the spicules of this herb
