"The voluntary consent of the human subject is absolutely essential. This means that the person involved should have legal capacity to give consent; should be situated as to exercise free power of choice, without the intervention of any element of force, fraud, duress, over-reaching, or other ulterior form of constraint or coercion, and should have sufficient knowledge and comprehension of the elements of the subject matter involved to enable him to make an understanding and enlightened decision. A few things in no particular order...

I think mRNA was likely a bioweapon. So I don't see what I'm writing about as a pivot Covid accountability. While I know we've never agreed on the technological capability not competing for attention in my head. To me, it's the same story deployed through vector.

To your question about the pilot, we don't disagree that attributed cause and actual cause and do diverge, especially in the post-2021 window. Thank you both for an interesting exchange. I've read most of the comment response to this and do think there's a real distinction in this thread worth making.

For context, I've read Roytas and Cowan and tend to lean toward terrain theory, though I'm not an expert and I hold the position with humility.

Where I'd push back is that two separate questions are getting treated as one. The first is whether germ theory accurately describes how disease moves between bodies. That's the terrain-versus-germ debate. In my view, it's a serious issue that doesn't get nearly enough airtime in our public discourse.

The second is whether a tick can inject a foreign substance into a person's bloodstream that the body then reacts to. Maybe I'm wrong but I think that's a toxicology question. A wasp or snake can inject venom, right? A tick engineered to carry a foreign protein could theoretically inject that protein the same way. Richet explored this a century ago whether the immune system reacts to that protein. See Robert Richet's citation earlier in the thread...
